An update on Year 10...





Ahead of our final newsletter of the year, I asked departments to share the successes of students, both recently and across the year as a whole, here are some of their thoughts:

In economics, Mr Wallis would like to recognise the achievements of Piriyankan, Praveenra, Daniel, Alison A, Tiffany, Dylan and Varun. On to PE, where John E topped the scores of students recent assessments, achieving a fantastic 55/60, whilst Mr Jones would like to praise 10A for their exceptional efforts in sociology this term, particularly Nathaniel, Adelaide and Hannah, who all scored well in the last tests.

In history, Mr Bell reports that Year 10 are in a good place to start Year 11. Every class has finished the most difficult unit of their GCSE course, British America, which requires a lot of independent study to consolidate classroom learning. The year has ended with an end of year test that covered all three aspects of content already covered and there were some fabulous results across the year group, notably Henry and Alessandra.

In Latin, students have now completed their understanding of the Latin language component of the course and are nearing the end of the Roman History aspect. Next year, students will move on to analyse the ancient literature of the Roman world in its original Latin. Alongside this, students will be revising some of the more complex elements of Latin grammar to enable them to achieve their highest potential at the end of Year 11. There were some real stand-out performances in the end of year Latin test, including Tiffany who scored an overall 88%. Well done to everyone for their ongoing commitment to Latin. Over summer it is imperative that they stay on top of their Latin vocabulary, ready to come back well prepared in September.

Elsewhere, in dance our congratulations go to the Year 10 dancers who have now completed their first solo examination filming, demonstrating excellent skill and perseverance. Meanwhile, in child development, students are finishing a piece of coursework with the general standard looking very positive, according to Miss Leppard.

In science, Year 10 have now completed three quarters of their GCSE course. This means that they have covered a wide range of topics in biology, chemistry and physics. As part of their homework, all Year 10 students have been completing exam question booklets to ensure that they are familiar with the style of questions that they will face in the real exams. Alongside this, students have been completing Tassomai, an online system, every day to top up their core knowledge. Miss Hemming has suggested that over the holidays it is really important that students continue to complete Tassomai and look back over the exam question booklets they were provided with for homework in order to keep up their knowledge in the run up to the all-important Year 11.

In addition, our art and technology students have now completed their summer art, product design, fashion textiles and graphics exams. Below is a particularly eye catching piece of art by Olivia as she demonstrates experimentation with new media. Olivia used a polystyrene plate to create textural landscapes. Well done, Olivia.



It is also worth mentioning that the school is organising a trip to Paris in October 2019 for students taking GCSE French. This trip is a once in a lifetime opportunity during where students would be able to visit the main historical monuments of Paris, experience a day at Disneyland Paris and most importantly, practise French in an authentic environment. A letter will be sent home shortly to confirm more details about the trip and how to book it.

Finally, I would like to thank all students, families and staff, particularly the Year 10 tutor team, for their hard work and support this year. Students have embraced significant changes to the behaviour and homework systems and are well placed to tackle the challenges of Year 11.



RECORD BREAKERS AT THE ATHLETICS CHAMPIONSHIP 2019

The PE department held its annual Athletics Championships at the David Weir Arena on Tuesday 9th July. There were perfect weather conditions – with clouds to give shade for the competitors and spectators.

The day started with the Year 7 and 8 competition. Students participated in all events: discus, shot, javelin, triple jump, long jump, high jump, 1500m, 800m, 300m, 200m, 100m, 8x50m and 4x100m. The highlight of the morning was Joseph in Year 8 beating the school record in the 300m race.

The afternoon saw the Year 9 and 10 competitions, again in

ideal weather conditions. More records were broken in the afternoon, with Roman breaking the Year 9 javelin record (which had already been beaten this year by Fletcher at Borough Sports) and Tiya beating the Year 10 300m race record. At the end of the day, scores were added together as a whole and Mr House announced that Red House were victorious as the overall winners of the day.

AN UPDATE ON SCHOOL UNIFORM

Our new Year 7 students joining in September will be sporting a whole new look.

Unfortunately, our school uniform supplier, SWI, no longer manufactures the sweatshirt that is a core part of our uniform, which has made a change necessary. The new uniform is a white shirt, with a clip-on tie denoting the year group, and a green jumper. The colours for the ties are clearly identified on the our uniform supplier's website, and are as follows:

- Year 7 joining in Sept 2019 Purple stripe on the tie
- Year 8 from Sept 2019 Red stripe on the tie
- Year 9 from Sept 2019 Yellow stripe on the tie
- Year 10 from Sept 2019 White stripe on the tie
- Year 11 from Sept 2019 Green stripe on the tie

We are always conscious of the financial impact which this type of decision has on families and look for ways to phase in changes. From September 2019, Year 7 will wear the new uniform: white shirt, tie and jumper. No other year group will have to change until September 2020. This will allow families to move to the new uniform when they would likely be looking to buy uniform. Students who are in Year 11 in September will not need to purchase the new uniform, and will be able to retain their existing uniform. Students and families wishing to change earlier can move to the new uniform as soon as they wish. The old uniform is no longer available on the SWI website.

The House system will continue, and remains a part of competition at Greenshaw. Students are proud of their house, as we saw when Red House were victorious at sports day last week. We are conducting a staff and student competition to decide on the new house names, and will share these once this has been completed at the start of next year.

SHARING HIS EXPERIENCE

Last week, we welcomed Clifford William, a former Greenshaw student, back to our school. He spoke to us about his experience as a gay teenager in Sutton and what it was like to be a gay student in Greenshaw High School in the 1970s. We explored how far the world has come and how much things have changed since then. Unlike our school community today, Clifford shared that when he was in Greenshaw there were no openly LGBT+ students or staff members and the only LGBT+ celebrity he could look up to was David Bowie. He only knew of one LGBT+ youth club, which was all the way up the Northern Line. Finding fellow LGBT+ teenagers who were 'just like him' was worth the trek.

As an adult, he has become involved in LGBT+ History, which is in some ways hidden. He told us that many gay men had to burn their diaries and journals, for fear of being exposed, blackmailed or fired because of their sexuality.

A key message he left our students with was that being LGBT+ is only one part of their multi-angled identity. It's important to find balance between being LGBT+ and being all the other fantastic things that they are too!

GREENSHAW ACHIEVES RESEARCH SCHOOL STATUS



We are excited to announce that from September, Greenshaw High School will be joining the national Research School network. The network is funded by the Education Endowment

Foundation (EEF) and aims to promote the use of evidence to help improve teaching practice. Research Schools act as hubs in various regions that engage schools with research findings through training and support.

There will now be 31 Research Schools in the country, but we are very proud that Greenshaw is the only secondary Research School in the London area.

Director of Greenshaw Research School, Phil Stock, said: "This is an exciting opportunity for us to work with primary and

secondary schools in our region to help translate the findings of research into improved teaching practice. Over the past few years, we have gained expertise in how best to implement evidence effectively and this gives us a chance to share some of these insights with others through training and support."

Sir Kevan Collins, EEF chief executive, said: "We're at an important moment in the potential of evidence to improve teaching and learning in England's schools, particularly for our most disadvantaged young people. However, too few schools have the time and resources to take on and implement evidence."

He said the expanded network will work with schools, councils and academy trusts to improve teaching and learning, developing "practical tools, training courses, professional development and coaching, all based on the best available evidence".



Teacher wins award for debut novel

Maths teacher, Mr Khan, has won a prestigious award for his debut novel, inspired by his experience of losing a family member to religious extremism. He was named winner of the 20th Branford Boase Award, one of the most influential for children's books in the UK.

He felt compelled to write *I Am Thunder*, which chronicles the radicalisation of a young Muslim girl growing up in London, after news broke of three Bethnal Green schoolgirls travelling to Syria to join Islamic State in 2015.

Mr Khan, who grew up in Balham with his first-generation immigrant Pakistani parents, said: "I wrote I am Thunder for everyone. I hope it's an exciting and thrilling story; a story that takes a stereotype and turns it on its head; a story that encourages people from all walks of life to become the superhero they are destined to be by speaking their truth and owning it."

One of Mr Khan's own relatives was drawn into Islamic extremism years ago, ultimately moving abroad. In his book, he tells the story of a young Muslim girl, Muzna, presented with a series of similar choices, who manages to avoid being dragged into the same world.

Speaking of his own experience, he said: "Almost overnight, this person began to change into someone unrecognisable. Suddenly we were deemed 'evil' and not 'true Muslims.' It was a complete shock which got me conducting my own research and meeting with a variety of Muslims, just as Muzna does in *I am Thunder*. I arrived at a very different conclusion. Islam is about bringing people together with compassion and hope, not driving them apart. The more research Muzna does, the more she is able to articulate why extremism is wrong and her faith compels her to speak out against it."

NOBODY DESERVES ABUSE FOR BEING WHO THEY ARE

In June, the LGBT+ student group led a series of assemblies to mark LGBT+ Pride. These assemblies focused on the idea of protecting people from discrimination, regardless of who they are, because, discrimination is not an LGBT+ only issue. It affects everyone. The Equal Opportunity Act (2010) lists a range of characteristics that cannot be discriminated against. These include: age, race, gender identity, sex, disability and religion/belief. Mocking, teasing or making negative comments about any of these protected characteristics is considered discrimination. We, as a community in Greenshaw, strive to promote inclusivity and respect for everyone.

The assemblies looked at information from science, religions and different cultures around the world in order to collect facts and opinions about LGBT+ identities. New research shows that the brains of transgender teenagers are more similar to the brains of the gender they identify with, than to the brains of the gender they were born with. We also learned that various cultures around the world identify more than just male/female and men/women as sexes and gender identities. In addition, we read a quote from a letter from Christian,

Muslim and Jewish religious leaders preaching tolerance and acceptance of all, including LGBT+ identities.

The assembly finished by focusing on what LGBT+ and non-LGBT+ students at Greenshaw have in common, and on the differences they have. If we can learn to celebrate our differences and our similarities, we can continue to make Greenshaw a welcoming place to all.
