Introduction to the GCSEs

Subject focus

Last year saw a prominent part of each newsletter as a subject focus which provides information and key content for specific subjects which are studied by our students. This issue I would like to focus on performing arts:

Music



At the beginning of the year, students improve their performing by learning songs and pieces of music they are interested in.

We analyse song writing through listening to a broad spectrum of musical styles and students will gain a deeper understanding of the musical features that underpin different styles of music, with a particular emphasis on pop music for the first weeks of the term.

Unfortunately this year we will not be unable to offer instrumental tuition because we are reviewing our current set up in the department and making some structural changes that will have an immediate impact on our practice rooms. We will restart instrumental tuition next year but this year I strongly suggest that students take private lessons outside school, so they develop the instrumental (or vocal) abilities needed for the GCSE qualification.

Drama



In drama, Ms Brailsford wanted to acknowledge the really positive start that the student have made. Students have been learning about Stanislavski's 'The System', in the context of naturalism. Students will be working towards creating their own devised piece of theatre this term.

IXL Homework and Core Knowledge Summaries

As previously explained In Year 8, students in Year 9 are expected to spend some of their homework time during the week doing maths and English activities on IXL.

English and maths classroom teachers use FROG to assign the topics students need to complete for the week. Tutors will be checking that every student has completed a total of one hour (unless otherwise informed) for both English and maths. This time allocation is spread over three separate days.

IXL is a very powerful programme and we are very pleased with the many positive comments we have had from both parents and students regarding the benefits of this programme. We strongly encourage you to log into your child's account where you will be able to see the topics of strength or weakness, types of questions they are getting wrong, and a broad range of additional topics they could challenge themselves with.

In addition to the IXL homework, over four days per week – Monday to Thursday – your child will be expected to complete 20 minutes of core knowledge summary work each night, which is found in the journal. The exception to this is Wednesdays, when IXL homework is replaced with 20 minutes of religious studies homework and 20 minutes of a homework concept called 'Big Words For Big Ideas'. There is a timetable of the homework overview on page 40 of your child's journal for further clarification on this.

Intermediate Maths Challenge

The Intermediate Maths Challenge will run in February 2019 and so there will be more details shared nearer the time. However, I thought it would be of interest to parents to learn about this in advance so this can be discussed at home.

The Intermediate Maths Challenge is a maths paper sat by students across the country. It involves questions that require problem solving and thinking about maths in a completely different way to how you might in the classroom. It is aimed to stretch and engage the most keen mathematicians in Years 9 to 11.

This year's paper will be sat on Thursday 7th February and classes can complete a practice paper in the week before the challenge.

The paper contains 25 multiple choice questions. Of these, the first 15 are more accessible, whilst the final 10 will provide more food for thought. Gold, silver and bronze certificates are awarded to 40% of participants nationally. These certificates are recognised by colleges and UCAS. The most successful participants are invited to enter follow-on rounds; Kangaroos (multiple choice questions) or Olympiads requiring full written answers.

Perseverance



Mr House led this sequence of assemblies on the theme of perseverance. This is one of the school's five core expectations, to persevere with learning. Mr House explained why our bodies can find this a challenge, and why when we think hard our brain demands a lot of energy.

Mr House also spoke about the moral virtue of perseverance, and how great leaders over time have had to show huge amounts of perseverance. He told the story of Martin Luther King Jr, and how he persisted with the civil rights movement, despite resistance and huge challenge. Mr House finished with the quote from Martin Luther King: "Whatever you do, you have to keep moving forwards" and encouraged students and staff to adopt a similar mindset.
