An update on Year 13...





It has only been a few weeks since our first newsletter, but there is already so much to inform you about. By the time you read this newsletter, then you've most likely met with your child's teachers at parents evening, and I hope this has given you a good understanding of the challenges facing our Year 13s and how to support them in their final year of school. This term is always incredibly busy for Year 13s and most are now well underway with their UCAS applications, or have organised meetings with Mrs Sone to discuss alternative pathways after this year.

I am incredibly proud of the hard work and resilience shown by our Year 13 students since they came back in September. I have spoken to many of them about how hard they are working, and there is a strong ethos across the year group that they are aiming to achieve highly. We have now seen the first group of students make their applications to a wide range of courses across the country. We always have a high number of students who wish to study medicine, dentistry or apply for Oxbridge, and this year has been no exception. Tutors, Mrs Sone and Miss Buchanan have been working intensely with these students to ensure that their applications are as strong as they can be before we sent them off for the October 15th deadline. This also means that all other students should now be making good progress with applications and be looking to send their applications off before or just after half term.

As part of their wider commitment to our school community, many Year 13 students also opted to volunteer for the school's open evening where we welcomed an endless queue of Year 5 and 6 students and their families. Salman and Molly, our Head Boy and Girl joined Mr House in making presentations throughout the night to huge crowds, and were also credited for their work in preparing two Year y students who delivered speeches about their first few weeks at Greenshaw. Walking around the school, I was very proud of the contribution that our sixth form students were making, not only in helping our visitors, but also in the support they were giving to younger students and staff. The sixth form's open evening for current Year 11 students is on Thursday 22nd November, and I am sure that departments will again be keen for volunteers to help inform visitors about individual A level subjects and the wider sixth form.

Finally, I need to mention the event of the year in 2019 – the Year 13 Prom! I realise that this seems a bit keen, but we have already had to book the venue due to such high demand at that time of year. Year 13 prom will be on Wednesday 26th June from 6.30pm until 11.00pm at Kingswood Golf and Country Club, which provides an excellent setting for such an event and allows the students to 'go to town' on their formal dress. The price of each ticket is £42.95 and a non-refundable deposit of £15 needs to be paid after half term using the parent online system www.scopay.com before the end of the school day on Monday 17th December.

I realise that Year 13 students will have much to do over half term but I hope that there is also some time for relaxation and recuperation ready for the next busy half term.

Celebrating Greenshaw's 50th birthday!

The afternoon of 29th September saw a very special occasion – an event to celebrate Greenshaw High School's 50th anniversary. Over 300 former students and staff attended the event, together with current members of staff. Visitors were greeted by the festive sight of bunting and balloons waving in the autumn sunshine, whilst former members of staff from the music department could be heard singing from inside the school hall.

Current Headteacher, Nick House, and former headteachers, John Fuller (1990 to 2010) and Will Smith (2010 to 2015), then officially opened the proceedings by welcoming the visitors and sharing their memories of Greenshaw. Mr House said that the school's ethos and vision had not changed over the years and it remained a special place, even though much of the school had changed and evolved.

This was followed by a fabulous fashion show – called The GHS Surplus Collection – which was created from old Greenshaw uniform by GCSE and A level Fashion and Textiles students with Mr Broniecki, Greenshaw's Head of Fashion and Textiles. Students modelled their creations and then gave the audience a sneak preview of the Year 13 final fashion collection.

Our visitors then enjoyed a barbecue and drinks in the school quadrangle, whilst being entertained by music through the decades from an ex-student. Former students and staff took the opportunity to have tours of the school, where they

explored their old haunts and marvelled at the new extension and recent building improvements. Many commented on the fantastic displays of student work around the school.

The school has received many thanks from visitors following the event. David Carman, class of 1983 said: "On behalf of the 77-84 Greenshaw Group (Facebook), and I will also cautiously assume on behalf of everyone else whom attended the wonderful celebrations that was the 50th Anniversary Reunion 2018, we wish to commend and congratulate the entire Greenshaw High School team that contributed their time to ensure such a wonderful and memorable occasion.

The danger of hate crimes

Our recent series of assemblies, led by Mr Gardner, focused on the dangers associated with the rise in hate speech and hate crimes.

Such expressions have poisoned our social and political discourse, creating a climate of fear in which some people feel intimidated into silence. The issue was addressed through the example of Caroline Criado-Perez and her campaign for Jane Austen to be featured on the reverse of a £10.00 note. This modest
