An update on Year 12...





It has only been a few weeks since our first newsletter, but this time has gone incredibly quickly for Year 12s, and there is much to inform you about. This term is always extremely busy for Year 12 students and most are now settled into their new timetables and routines and making real progress in their chosen three A levels.

As our Year 12 students have now had some time to settle into and get a measure of sixth form life, the sixth form council is looking for a representative from each tutor group. Year 12 tutors are currently discussing who will be the

representative for their group, and have started to ask for students to nominate themselves. If your son or daughter shows an interest in this, please do encourage them to put themselves forward as the sixth form council is genuinely an excellent opportunity for students to make a real difference to shaping the experiences of current and future students.

As part of the Route to Success programme, Year 12 students have been introduced to an array of taster courses, conferences and open days run by a variety of universities often with the support of well-known organisations. Some students have already began to take advantage of these activities by attending afternoon lectures and applying for university taster sessions in London. These opportunities are invaluable for students at this stage in their education, enabling them to making links with possible future destinations and employment or apprenticeship opportunities. In keeping with this, tutors will also be speaking to your child about their future aspirations for after leaving Greenshaw. This could be to go to university, successfully apply for an apprenticeship, or employment. This information will be used by tutors and the sixth form staff team to gain a better understanding of students aspirations and tailor guidance for them in line with this.

Year 12 students have also now completed three sessions of their chosen enrichment course. This is an exciting opportunity for students to develop skills and experiences away from the classroom, and to focus on a project that they are interested in. There is a broad range of opportunities on offer, including the Duke of Edinburgh Silver Award, STEM, Young Enterprise and Sports Leaders, as well as creative pathways in writing and designing clothes. Some students have even opted to join a survival skills group which focuses on preparing them for practical tasks in case they leave home to go to university. While academic studies are clearly essential in ensuring that students have the best opportunities available to them post-sixth form, we also encourage Year 12 students to engage in hobbies and other extra-curricular opportunities for both their personal and social development.

Finally, as part of their wider commitment to our school community, many of our Year 12 students also opted to volunteer for the school's open evening, where we welcomed an endless queue of Year 5 and 6 students and their families. Walking around the school, I was very proud of the contribution that sixth form students were making, not only in helping our visitors, but also in the support they were giving to younger students and staff. The sixth form's open evening for current Year 11 students is on Thursday 22nd November, and I am sure that departments will again be keen for volunteers to help inform visitors about individual A level subjects and the wider sixth form.

After such a busy first term, we hope that there is much rest and recuperation planned for the half term, as well as consolidating their notes from this half term, and that your sons and daughters come back refreshed and ready for another significant term.

Celebrating Greenshaw's 50th birthday!

The afternoon of 29th September saw a very special occasion – an event to celebrate Greenshaw High School's 50th anniversary. Over 300 former students and staff attended the event, together with current members of staff. Visitors were greeted by the festive sight of bunting and balloons waving in the autumn sunshine, whilst former members of staff from the music department could be heard singing from inside the school hall.

Current Headteacher, Nick House, and former headteachers, John Fuller (1990 to 2010) and Will Smith (2010 to 2015), then officially opened the proceedings by welcoming the visitors and sharing their memories of Greenshaw. Mr House said that the school's ethos and vision had not changed over the years and it remained a special place, even though much of the school had changed and evolved.

This was followed by a fabulous fashion show – called The GHS Surplus Collection – which was created from old Greenshaw uniform by GCSE and A level Fashion and Textiles students with Mr Broniecki, Greenshaw's Head of Fashion and Textiles. Students modelled their creations and then gave the audience a sneak preview of the Year 13 final fashion collection.

Our visitors then enjoyed a barbecue and drinks in the school quadrangle, whilst being entertained by music through the decades from an ex-student. Former students and staff took the opportunity to have tours of the school, where they

explored their old haunts and marvelled at the new extension and recent building improvements. Many commented on the fantastic displays of student work around the school.

The school has received many thanks from visitors following the event. David Carman, class of 1983 said: "On behalf of the 77-84 Greenshaw Group (Facebook), and I will also cautiously assume on behalf of everyone else whom attended the wonderful celebrations that was the 50th Anniversary Reunion 2018, we wish to commend and congratulate the entire Greenshaw High School team that contributed their time to ensure such a wonderful and memorable occasion.

The danger of hate crimes

Our recent series of assemblies, led by Mr Gardner, focused on the dangers associated with the rise in hate speech and hate crimes.

The ubiquitous nature of the internet, and especially social media platforms, has led to an increasing number of people expressing hatred towards and intolerance of other individuals and groups. Such expressions have poisoned our social and political discourse, creating a climate of fear in which some people feel intimidated into silence. The issue was addressed through the example of Caroline Criado-Perez and her campaign for Jane Austen to be featured on the reverse of a £10.00 note. This modest
