An update on Year 12





As I write this letter I have been reflecting that the last few weeks seem to have flown by, and suddenly it is the end of the academic year, and students are off-site attending work shadowing placements in a range of fields including engineering, medicine, banking, law, marketing and the creative industries. An overhang from the pandemic means that there have been a number of virtual placements which are now also available to all students opening up opportunities across a range of sectors which otherwise may not have been easily accessible. If your child would like to apply for a

virtual placement in addition over the summer, then they should apply through Springpod, which can be found on the Careers page on Frog. I hope that this final week proves to be an enjoyable and productive week, and supports students in making informed decisions about their options after Year 13. Mock exams

The recent end of Year 12 mock exams highlighted some outstanding achievements for many students, demonstrating a huge amount of hard work, commitment and dedication throughout the school year. Congratulations to them all. Where students are less happy with their exam scores, they should be encouraged to contact me or Mrs Reid (Study Skills Manager) directly to put together a plan for closing any gaps in knowledge and developing good learning habits, including exam technique, for the start of Year 13. Our Head of Careers, Mrs Sone, is also on hand to support with career planning and looking at options for students who have not yet made a decision about their likely path after Year 13.

When they return to Year 13 in September, students will sit their autumn mock exam series. This is scheduled for 18th to 22nd September and it is really important that students study hard towards these, using the summer to consolidate their Year 12 content. All departments have set summer work for students which is expected to be completed. Please speak to your child about this and encourage them to maintain a healthy study/rest routine throughout the summer break.

University applications

You will be aware that your child has begun the UCAS process this past half term. Even where students are unsure of whether or not they want to apply to university, we encourage all students to complete a personal statement which could also be used for applying to apprenticeships, internships, degree apprenticeships and university. Students will supported by a highly experienced A Level teacher who has years of experience in supporting students through the UCAS application process and how to overcome the challenges involved in successfully completing A Levels. I recommend that you to speak to your child over the summer to encourage them to make a plan of action for the first half-term, both in order to send off UCAS applications (the school's official deadline is October half-term) and to make a pro-active start to their studies in Year 13. This is particularly the case where students are applying to medicine or Oxbridge, since the national deadline for submission is the 15th October.

Extra-curricular activities

Year 12 students have also been taking advantage of a number of extra-curricular and off-site opportunities available to them. There are too many to mention, especially in any detail, and I am well aware that I may have missed some out, but to recognise a few includes the Year 12 recruitment day (*pictured below*), supported and attended by a significant number of external employers such as JP Morgan, SES Water, Fidelity to name a few. All Year 12 students participated in an assessment centre demonstrating







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group working skills, an elevator pitch and an individual interview with one of the external recruiters attending on the day. In addition, there has been the staff versus Sixth Form football match (*pictured above*), a basketball game, a STEM day trip to UCL, continuation of work towards the Extended Project Qualification (EPQ), summer schools, the Duke of Edinburgh Silver trip and volunteering to support the school's annual athletics championship. A big thank you to all those students who have contributed positively to the wider school community, and well done to those who are making a pro-active attempt to gain the information needed to make informed decisions about courses and vacancies once they leave Greenshaw Sixth Form next summer.

Finally, it gives me immense pleasure to announce our newly appointed head students, Holly and Omar. They will be working closely with a host of representatives for different causes across the year group such as charity and communities representative, academic and subject reps, student mentors and Bold Voices ambassadors to help foster an ethos of personal connection, wellbeing and support amongst the current and new sixth form cohort.

I wish you and your child a peaceful and happy summer, and look forward to them coming back in Year 13 after a rest with a renewed sense of determination and commitment to achieve highly in their A Levels.

EQUALITY, DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION AT GREENSHAW

Greenshaw is a community that values equality, diversity and inclusion (known as EDI). This year, the EDI team has continued to develop its work both in and outside of the curriculum. The shared vision is to create a culture where every individual can feel safe and represented. Fostering a sense of belonging and celebration to empower our students so they can aim to achieve their full potential.

Staff have recently worked together to highlight and thread diversity using the protected characteristics through the curriculum. For example, in English during the teaching of *An Inspector Calls*, students will gain a deeper understanding of gender stereotyping and misogynist behaviours. During core PE, students will take part in disability awareness week where students will gain an understanding taking part in a sport with an impairment for example, boccia and sitting volleyball. In PSHE, the curriculum lessons on crime and punishment develop student understanding of hate crime and everyone has the right to live without fear and harassment.

The EDI team has been facilitating a variety of activities outside of the curriculum this year to promote diversity. The prayer room is staffed five days a week, our Bold Voices ambassadors have supported the PSHE curriculum delivering extended 'do nows' on sexual harassment/online sexual harassment, and they are currently designing a social action for the autumn term on gender in equality. The EDI Frog page has been launched and is full of information and news for students to freely access. We have had a very successful Sixth Form cultural celebration event (pictured) and we have organised a weekly south Asian appreciation group for students.
