As we approach the end of a long term, I look back and reflect on all that has taken place over the past year. We are now in a position where all the GCSE options have been made for next year and, as the end of Year 8 draws nearer, we reflect on the strides forward that our youngsters have made throughout the year. We have seen them grow and mature into the young adults that they are today who hold such promise and optimism for Year 9 and the GCSE pathways ahead.

The last few weeks have seen Year 8 students sit their end of year assessments to demonstrate what they have learnt over the year. In addition, teachers have provided their views on every student's attitude to learning. These results will be shared with

both students and parents imminently, and we hope that this will be a useful tool for discussions on what the next steps are towards every student reaching their full potential. The students are acutely aware that anything short of an A or B will need to be addressed as a matter of priority, and students should be aiming to make targets for themselves in subjects where they can develop both in terms of attainment or effort. If you are in any doubt over why an attitude to learning score was given, I would encourage you to contact the member of staff directly to discuss this.

We continue to build on the three core principles upon which are built into the Greenshaw curriculum and our daily work at school. The principles are as follows:

- · Knowledge is powerful.
- · Language unlocks the world.
- Personal and collective responsibility helps society to flourish.

We have had a weekly opportunity to celebrate students' success in the areas above in the vast variety of fine examples of the high standard of work in Year 8. This beautifully presented science work by Athesaya in 8DM (seen below) demonstrates the excellent work that is consistently seen across Year 8 which we are very proud of.

In addition, many of the pieces of exemplary work have been in the *Big Ideas That Shaped The World* that has been produced all year for homework, essays and other work completed in lessons. Some students have even exceeded expectations and created their own presentations and videos about specific topics and areas within the Big Ideas, an example below is by Kwaku in 8LOR (Industrial Revolution).

In line with building knowledge and language, we have been reading for the majority of morning registrations and have finished our final book of the year, *Refugee Boy*, just in time for the summer break. Students have been fully engaged each morning; reading together, exploring key themes, learning new words and producing summaries. Research shows that increased levels of literacy leads to increased GCSE results in the future. I hope students have found something they have enjoyed reading this past year and continue to do so over the holiday and beyond.

Last Tuesday, Year 8 students enjoyed their annual sports day. Their behaviour and encouragement of each other was outstanding and they represented themselves and their tutor groups in a very positive light. See page 2 for more on sports day. We were also pleased to invite Sahana in 8LOR to write her own sports day report which is included also. It was a really well written report and it was fantastic to see sports day through the eyes of a Year 8 student.

Recently, over the last term, all students in Year 8 have enjoyed receiving assemblies about the theme of the term, 'Responsibility', and many students have been recognised as 'tutees of the week' nominated by their tutors, and 'students of the week' as nominated by myself, as their Head of Year for taking responsibility for themselves, each other and the local and global community. May I take this opportunity again to thank our fabulous tutors for supporting the students, and our parents and carers for guiding their children and helping them to be prepared with a positive mindset for school and the selection of their GCSE subjects next year. It is also with a heavy heart that we have to say goodbye to some of the tutors next year; Mr Claisse and Miss Haylock, who are moving on to pastures new. We wish you the best of luck in your new schools.

GREENSHAW ATHLETICS CHAMPIONSHIPS

On Tuesday 11th July, Year 7 and 8 enjoyed a fun-filled day of athletics and friendly competition, with students enthusiastically cheering on their classmates.

Various track and field events occurred simultaneously around the vast David Weir Leisure Centre Arena. The day kicked off with the 800m race, which tested students' cardiovascular endurance. A group of Year 7 boys shot off at the sound of the starter pistol, with one young runner prominently in the lead. An outstanding performance from Sam (7LAN) saw him break the 300m record with a time of 46.10s. As for Year 8, Sarmad of 8LOR was leading in the home stretch, and he finished off with first place!

In the high jump, students utilised a variety of techniques such as the scissor kick and the Fosbury Flop to clear the bar, of which the latter seemed to guarantee success! A few feet away was the discus event where each student had three attempts to hurl the heavy frisbee as far as they could. Maya from 8LOR proficiently thrust the discus furthest in her first attempt, but it was Ruby of 8TF who ultimately triumphed.

A school record was broken in the javelin event by one of our Year 7 students. Daniel from 7HCL won gold, while Mahira from the same tutor group secured second place. Nearby, Imogen from 8DBL soared ahead to gold in the long jump, followed by Maya from 8LOR. For the boys' long jump, Thomas from 8LOR clinched silver too.

Back at the track events, a very speedy young lady wearing a yellow headband streaked past like a bullet in the Year 7 300m race. 7LAN were triumphant overall, and didn't hesitate to celebrate their multiple victories. As for Year 8, Jess was a favourite for the 300m finals and seized gold; her male counterpart was Khittush from 8TF. In the 100m girls' final, Victoria from 8DM was the champion.

Meanwhile, the spectators were having a ball – waving banners, chanting slogans and making a deafening noise using clackers and inflatables. Several Year 7s wore self-designed jerseys, armbands and facepaint advertising their tutor groups. We were blessed with a surprise visit from Harry Aikines-Aryeety, Olympic gold medalist and alumnus of Greenshaw High School. Students proudly showed off their autographed notes and t-shirts and were inspired by our celebrity guest.

Overall, the Greenshaw Year 7 and 8 sports day was a huge success and a great opportunity for students to practise teamwork, sportsmanship and their athletic abilities. A great day was had by all with 7LAN and 8DM announced as sports day winners during their celebration assembly.

EQUALITY, DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION AT GREENSHAW

Greenshaw is a community that values equality, diversity and inclusion (known as EDI). This year, the EDI team has continued to develop its work both in and outside of the curriculum. The shared vision is to create a culture where every individual can feel safe and represented. Fostering a sense of belonging and celebration to empower our students so they can aim to achieve their full potential.

Staff have recently worked together to highlight and thread diversity using the protected characteristics through the curriculum. For example, in English during the teaching of *An Inspector Calls*, students will gain a deeper understanding of gender stereotyping and misogynist behaviours. During core PE, students will take part in disability awareness week where students will gain an understanding taking part in a sport with an impairment for example, boccia and sitting volleyball. In PSHE, the curriculum lessons on crime and punishment develop student understanding of hate crime and everyone has the right to live without fear and harassment.

The EDI team has been facilitating a variety of activities outside of the curriculum this year to promote diversity. The prayer room is staffed five days a week, our Bold Voices ambassadors have supported the PSHE curriculum delivering extended 'do nows' on sexual harassment/online sexual harassment, and they are currently designing a social action for the autumn term on gender in equality. The EDI Frog page has been launched and is full of information and news for students to freely access. We have had a very successful Sixth Form cultural celebration event (pictured) and we have organised a weekly south Asian appreciation group for students.
