

RISING TO THE CHALLENGE





What an amazing first term Year 9 students have had, with a particularly busy lead up towards a well-deserved Christmas break. Year 9 were always inevitably predicted to be a 'step-up' from Years 7 and 8, particularly as our students have embarked on studying two of their GCSE optional pathway subjects. GCSE subjects will provide more detail and complexity, and require even more determination, than they have faced in previous years. I couldn't be more proud of the way in which Year 9 students have risen to this challenge with resilience and perseverance – values that we always

strive for at Greenshaw and we wish for the students to embody. Their response has been outstanding, with the year group demonstrating these values in an array of situations.

This term I have asked Year 9 students 'to make a difference to their success'. We have talked frequently in assemblies about how each student is responsible for their own individual success by applying themselves, showing consistent effort and not giving up when the work is difficult in their lessons. In turn, by making small developments themselves and showing a positive attitude to learning, they are also helping others around them to learn by setting an example of what we would expect students to demonstrate at school. This also helps their tutor group to perform well in the league table, a fun rewards programme that we hold every week which highlights students in their collective efforts and commitment to excellence.

I have been fortunate to visit many of the lessons taking place and have seen excellent attitudes being demonstrated in the classroom. The eagerness to learn is evident in every class, with students pushing themselves, getting things wrong in the process and learning from their mistakes. I never cease to be impressed by the quality and standard of work that is produced by our students.

The year group will undertake 'summative assessments' at the start of January 2024, when we return to school for the spring term. These will include multiple choice questions, as well as written responses. The assessment scores will be available to parents and carers in the new year when the assessments have been reviewed. Parents and carers will shortly be able to access a report summarising the autumn term. These reports will be published and made available imminently and include information about your child's attitude to learning in addition to attendance and behaviour data, and I very much look forward to hearing the positive responses from parents when these are received.



POSITIVE OFSTED NEWS

Following Ofsted's inspection of Greenshaw High School in October, the report has now been published. The school was graded 'good' at the last visit in 2017, so this was an ungraded inspection and did not change the overall school grading. However, the report shows the Ofsted team found many excellent things happening at Greenshaw, and have recommended a reinspection next year. The report states that: 'the evidence gathered suggests that the inspection grade might be outstanding if a graded inspection were carried out now.'

We are really proud that the inspectors' report uses words like 'happy and safe' to describe the children at Greenshaw High School, alongside phrases like 'relationships between staff and pupils are kind and respectful'. The inspectors also noted 'high expectations for all' and that 'behaviour is excellent', along with comments such as '... pupils with SEND receive strong guidance to make sure that they learn successfully'.

This reflects work over several years focusing on curriculum content and sequencing, as well as weekly staff development sessions (known as Professional Growth) focusing on the closest elements of teaching and learning.

Our Headteacher, Mr House, said: "I am proud of the excellent achievement of all of our students, regardless of their starting point. I am also delighted that the Ofsted team recognised the personal virtues of our young people, which is something that we seek to develop every day."

Greenshaw results in top 10%

We were delighted with our summer 2023 GCSE results, but comparing the progress our students made, with that made by other students across the country, can only be done when all the results are gathered by the Department for Education, and we were very proud of what the data confirmed.

For example:

- · In English, students in our school made over two thirds of a grade more progress than all students nationally;
- In Maths, one in two of our students achieved a grade 7, 8 or 9 (equivalent to A or A*); and
- Overall, our progress is likely to put us in the top 10% of schools nationally.

Although this year's group of GCSE students did not benefit from the significantly reduced grade boundaries of last summer, they did exceptionally well. The proportion of students achieving grades at 9-7 (equivalent to A* or A) and 9-4 grades (the old A*-C scores) were the highest in the history of the school, other than in the pandemic years. The attitude of Year 11 students of summer 2023 was superb – their commitment to high quality revision and attending additional study sessions, alongside first rate teaching, bought home a brilliant set of results.

Our Year 13 students also sat their first set of public exams this summer, having had their GCSE examinations cancelled due to the Covid pandemic. They rose to the challenge of the last two years, with a fantastic approach to their A Level courses. We could not be prouder of their efforts and were thrilled that those efforts paid dividends. There were some fantastic results, with one in three of all grades being an A* or A. As an indication, the overall attainment is significantly above our 2019 results (the last year of 'normal exams'), which in themselves were really pleasing.

Importantly, we were delighted to see that the vast majority of our students were able to take up their first choice university place, and we wish them the best of luck with their chosen course. We were particularly thrilled for Ananya who has taken up her place at the University of Oxford to study classics, Emen who was accepted to study medicine at Queen Mary's, and to Konrad who is studying architecture at the University of Bath.

There are many other achievements that are worthy of mention. Jakub achieved an impressive 4A*s at A Level, as well as an A* in his Extended Project Qualification and is studying physics at Imperial. Other students who achieved straight A/A* grades are Alhassan, Alice, Aloke, Aleksandar, Anas, Anna, Emen, Hadi, Joseph, Jose-Gonçalo, Konrad, Mackenzie, Maddison, Muhamed, Olly and Rhiannon.









Spanish students visit Greenshaw

A group of 21 students and two staff from a school in Galicia, in the northwest of Spain, spent two weeks in our school in October as part of an integration programme. They were paired with our Spanish GCSE students and accompanied them to all their lessons for the whole fortnight.

Both our students and the visitors had an unforgettable experience. It was great to see how our visitors engaged with learning in our classes. The buddies got on so well and had plenty of opportunities to teach each other Spanish and English. It was so inspiring to see them talking and socialising during breaks and lunch times, getting to know each other's lifestyles, interests and culture. It was a really enriching and extremely popular event that we will happily run again to provide our students with opportunities to develop not only their social and language skills, but also their personalities and outlook.

Both groups of students embodied a spirit of welcome and friendship which was a real bonus at the start of the school year.

Supporting White Ribbon Day



We have been selling and wearing white ribbons at Greenshaw to promote White Ribbon Day (which was on

Saturday 25th November) and to demonstrate our commitment to #ChangeTheStory for women and girls. White Ribbon UK is a charitable organisation whose mission is to prevent male violence against women and girls by addressing its root causes. The root causes are long-established attitudes, behaviours and systems around masculinity that reinforce gender inequality. To reduce violence against women and girls, a change of culture is required – this cannot happen overnight, but it



starts with challenging seemingly 'harmless' attitudes and behaviours that can contribute to a culture where such views are normalised which can then lead to more extreme behaviours.

Males are also victims of violent crime, but the majority of violent crimes are committed by males –approximately 80% of violent crime and a bigger proportion of sex offences. Women are more likely to be victims of domestic abuse and a recent Femicide Census found that over the past ten years a woman was killed by a man every three days, and a woman is killed by a former or current partner every four days in the UK.

At Greenshaw, we have already taken action over the last couple of years. For example, through our training of staff and through PSHE lessons for students. The PSHE Social Action group, led by Miss Webb (Assistant Headteacher), have recently delevered some student-led assemblies to promote the idea that we can all contribute to change by just committing to taking one small action. If you would like to find out more, White Ribbon has some great resources that you might want to have a look at White Ribbon Day 2023. In addition, we have a domestic abuse ambassador (Mrs Ashworth) and a sexual misconduct lead (Ms Radwan) as part of our safeguarding team, who can offer support and guidance.

AN UPDATE ON THE BUILDING PROJECT

Greenshaw High School has been fortunate to receive direct funding from the Department for Education for a rebuild of a large part of its site. This was based on a conditions survey several years ago that assessed the fabric of its buildings and the energy efficiency, amongst other factors.

They also took into consideration the difficulties in our large number of students moving around a site that was designed for so many fewer students sixty years ago.

When we returned to school in September, there were significant signs of preparations made for the 'big building work over the summer break'. The unhelpful brick circles across the centre of the playground had been removed (that often led to trips to the First Aid room), as had the site manager's bungalow. However, over the months since there has been little physical change to the outside spaces and students could be forgiven for wondering what is actually going on.

There has been a lot of work between the school and the contractors. This work, along with negotiations with UK Power Network and London Borough of Sutton regarding the installation of a new substation to power the new buildings, have taken a lot of the focus for school and DfE staff.

Works are planned to begin on site at the start of February 2024. The temporary buildings order has been placed, so that these can begin to be made off site whilst the contractual works are ongoing and protect the project timeline.

Demolition works should then begin during the autumn term, with students planned to be using the larger of the two new blocks by June 2026. So, although there has been little construction work over the last three months there has definitely been a lot of progress and we look forward to the next steps in the new year.







Year 13 students explore THE SOUTH DOWNS

34 of our Year 13 students successfully undertook their Silver Award assessed expedition for their Duke of Edinburgh over the weekend of 13th to 15th October.

Their weekend comprised of walking 30 miles across Banstead Downs and the North Downs. Students carried all their kit, spent two nights camping and were responsible for cooking their meals.

Within their teams, the students used their compasses and map reading skills and set off on their pre-planned routes. At the campsite, all students excelled in their camp craft including cooking skills, maintaining a camp fire and tidy surroundings.

Miss Fingleton, Duke of Edinburgh Manager at Greenshaw High School and internal Duke of Edinburgh Assessor, assessed the students individually, specifically looking at teamwork, navigation and camp crafting skills. All students passed with flying colours.

Well done to everybody and a big thank you to all the staff that gave up their free time to support the students both at the campsite and at the checkpoints along the route. It is very much appreciated. The students will work on completing the other sections of the award and I look forward to presenting them with their Duke of Edinburgh certificate and Silver Award badge in the near future.

ASSEMBLIES AT GREENSHAW

At Greenshaw, we use our assemblies for a wide range of purposes, including celebrating students' achievements in and out of school. This term, Mr House has spoken in assembly about why we focus on the reading programme in tutor time. Following that, in October, a group of students talked about Black History Month, identifying their black icons and speaking of their role models. We also celebrated the festival of Diwali in assemblies and explained its significance.

In November, we addressed recent events in the Middle East, explaining to students about why conflict has happened across time (led by Miss Duce, Head of History). We also explained how, even in the most awful situations, there can be actions that we can take in our social groups, and

the wider community, that can bring hope and offer a way forwards. This was illustrated by Miss Mbema (Head of Religious Studies), who talked about individuals that have sought to bring peace to conflict.

Most recently, the school's PSHE Social Action group, led by Miss Webb (Assistant Headteacher), delivered some student-led assemblies to support White Ribbon Day (see page 5) to promote the idea that we can all contribute to change by just committing to taking one small action.

The assembly calendar is by design organic, allowing us to respond to issues and ideas as they arise, but the draft schedule for next term includes Holocaust Memorial Day, the history of LGBTQ+ rights and the concept of responsibility.
