An update on Year 8...



How fantastic it was to come back from celebrating the new year to continue celebrating the many outstanding grades Year 8 students received in the recent data collection.

With 241 students achieving an 'A' for their attitude to learning (the highest grade possible) and the vast majority of all attitude grades being As or Bs, it demonstrates a true reflection of what I have been lucky enough to see for myself when visiting many of the different subjects.

As I write of these accomplishments, I do so with eager anticipation of the

upcoming parents' evening where I hope the data collection will serve as a good platform to start productive conversations between the young people, teachers and yourselves.

Assessment and performance

More information on how students are performing will be available to view on FROG by the end of term. This will include information on their attitude to learning, homework and results from their most recent summative assessments. Parents/carers will receive a more detailed communication regarding reports towards the end of term.

Assessment hour

Students in Year 8 have a one hour timetabled assessment hour during Week 1 of their timetable. During this hour, students complete a multiple choice assessment consisting of ten questions on each of six different subjects. English, maths and science are assessed on each paper and history, MFL, art and technology, geography, RS and PE are assessed on alternate papers. Well-crafted multiple choice questions can target specific misconceptions and have the advantage of being marked electronically.

The purpose of these assessments is to provide students with an opportunity for retrieval practice of lesson content taught at different points in time, such as last week, last term and even last year. This approach helps to strengthen students' long term memory. It is also an opportunity for students to reflect on whether they have understood content from their lessons and to identify any topics that may need further support. The results of these assessments are also used by teachers to provide an insight into students' current understanding and informs their next steps.

If students are absent for their assessment hour, they miss out on these opportunities to practice their retrieval skills, reflect on their current understanding and develop both of these skills further. Teachers also do not receive information on your child's current understanding of topics and cannot support your child to address any misconceptions they may have immediately, which is the most effective time to address them.

To support the learning of your child, the Year 8 team offers an opportunity for students to catch up if they are absent for assessment hour on a Week 2 Monday after school. All students who were absent are given the opportunity to attend this catch up session, so that they do not miss out on the retrieval practice or the subsequent support from their subject teachers.

Your child's subject teachers and the Year 8 team are grateful for your support in ensuring that your child attends the catch up session if they are absent from assessment hour.




February half term – Monday 18th to Friday 22nd February

FOCUS: GEOGRAPHY

The Year 8 geography curriculum has so far seen the students learn about the natural and physical world. This begun by examining the world's large scale ecosystems or biomes: to identify what they are, where they are located, and how and why they are different. Students learnt how to distinguish each biome by four main characteristics: latitude, climate, vegetation and soil.

The students then studied the tropical rainforest and the hot desert in more detail. They investigated current issues around deforestation in the Amazon and learnt of some of the sustainable development initiatives that certain organisations, such as Greenpeace and the Rainforest Alliance, are employing in an attempt to halt and reverse the damage caused by deforestation.

We have now moved onto the dynamic topic of natural hazards. Students are exploring the very fabric of our planet by learning about the structure of the Earth, plate tectonic theory about how the continents came to be and the restless nature of earthquakes, volcanoes, tsunamis and tropical storms.

Sports results

Year 8 boys' basketball

Our Year 8 basketball team has played two great games in the last few weeks against Wimbledon and Lanfranc. They took on Wimbledon first, who were currently sitting at top of the league. This was one of the first few matches the team had played together and they gave them a good fight, just losing out 34-32. The following week they came out even stronger against Lanfranc and secured a 27-9 win. All of the team have shown great sportsmanship and commitment

Global distribution of earthquakes and volcanoes



Students will gain an insight into how our restless Earth can drastically affect human lives as we delve into case studies including the 2010 Haiti earthquake, the 2004 Boxing Day Indian Ocean Tsunami, and Hurricane Irene (2011) among others.

Students will learn about how humans overcome the perils of the natural world by ingenuity, compassion and resolve, and how we can use technology to preserve life and culture.

Students have shown a great interest in the natural world so far this year and many are genuinely concerned about some of the negative impact humans can have on the world. Several Year 8 students are currently delivering whole school assemblies about ways to reduce the need and impact of deforestation to our magnificent tropical rainforests around the world. It's great to see how the passion from the classroom is being transferred to real world issues.

Unfortunately, this behaviour has manifested in school with some friendship issues. I would ask that you are monitoring your child's usage of social media and ensuring their phone is being used appropriately. Additionally, we would like to make you aware that we have had reports of some inappropriate and sexually motivated comments made on the *Instagram* app towards some of our students recently. We believe that a number of children have been invited to follow or be following persons they have not met or do not know in real life. As a consequence, our safeguarding team has spoken to all students we believe have been contacted in this way and have told them to ensure that they thoroughly check all of their social media contacts and delete any contact they do not directly know.

We have informed the police and are asking you to be exceptionally vigilant with your son/daughter's internet activity.

How to keep your child safe online....

There have been a number of online safety concerns recently amongst our students. We will be hosting a parental workshop on 'How to keep your child safe online' on **Wednesday 13th February, from 6.00pm to 7.00pm**. Please email <u>lshaw@</u> <u>greenshaw.co.uk</u> if you would like to attend this, or one of the other workshops below.

Wednesday 13th February 2019, 6.00-7.00pm – **How to keep your child safe online** – Steve Welding, Sutton borough's e-safety advisor, will talk about the dangers which face your children online, as well as some tips and hints about security systems which you can install to support you to safeguard your child.

Tuesday 5th March, 6.30pm-7.30pm – Positive mental health – A representative from CAMHS (Children and Adolescent mental health service) will speak about how to support and cultivate positive mental health in your child.

Wednesday 15th May, 6.00-7.00pm – Specific Learning Difficulties – The school Inclusion team will discuss what specific learning difficulties means (including dyslexia), and strategies your child can use to support their learning if they do have difficulties.

Would you consider becoming a parent governor?

We currently have a vacancy for a parent governor on the Greenshaw High School governing body.

There is provision for two parent governors on the governing body, to work alongside other governors representing school staff, as well as governors appointed by the Greenshaw Learning Trust Board of Trustees and by the governing body itself. There is currently a total of ten governors.

The role of the school governor is both rewarding to the individual and invaluable to the school. You will need to be supportive of the values of the school and be able to give time and effort to further its ongoing development; support and training is provided.

No specific experience is required; however, the governing body would particularly welcome applications from parents with previous governor experience, or with experience in either education, other public sector settings, finance or business sectors.



As a governor you will be expected to attend meetings and take an active part in them, help the governing body make informed decisions, and get involved with the school and its pupils. The governing body normally meets six times a year, in the evening. You will also be asked to take on particular tasks in relation to the work of the governing body, such as being a lead governor for a specific area of school development, or to be part of ad-hoc sub committees of the governing body.

There are rules on a person's eligibility to be a governor, e.g. relating to bankruptcy and criminal convictions, and requirements on disclosure of interests and involvement in other bodies that could impact on the work of the Greenshaw Learning Trust or the school.

Parents wishing to stand for election are asked to complete the application form from the school website. Application forms must be returned to the school, marked for the attention of the Head of Clerking, Greenshaw Learning Trust, by the closing date of **Monday 4th February at 9.00 am**.

If more than one application is received, a ballot will be held in which all parents and carers may vote; in these circumstances the applicants' personal statements will be made available to all parents/carers to inform their vote.


