Year 11 students have made a positive start to the new academic year, showing excellent maturity and focus as they enter a crucial year of their education.

The first GCSE formal examination scheduled for a core subject is Religious Studies (RS) on Monday 11th May 2020. Miss Mbema would like to report that students have begun well this half term and to build on this strong start, all students should continue to adhere to the high expectations found within Greenshaw, which includes the completion of all homework in detail and on time. After half term, students will be given the opportunity to purchase the RS department revision

Mrs Forno would like to remind all Year 11 science students, combined and triple, that they must continue to complete four daily goals (or more) a week in order to complete the full Tassomai revision course by the time of their exams. Other science reminders are as follows:

- Students continuing to complete PAG practical tasks in lessons.
- · Students are reviewing individual knowledge with MCQ assessment.
- Students should be revising for their science exam in assessment week in November.

Miss Oliver's message to maths students is a similar one, with a reminder that four daily goals are expected on Hegarty Maths each week, whilst the weekly written homework component for maths will see students working on a past paper with them completing the paper on a week 1 and marking the paper on a week 2. In Latin, Year 11 have recently begun to look at Latin literature in its original language. Students have already translated and analysed the meaning and grammatical choices of Martial's Lament for a Dead Charioteer. This is a part of the course that is worth 30% of the GCSE and it is very impressive how the students have dealt with this so far. Moving forwards, students need to continue to revise their vocabulary and grammar in order to achieve the outcomes that they are capable of.

Elsewhere, key dates for our GCSE Dance students are as follows:

- 21st and 22nd January gym and dance display (performance of trios).

Whilst in drama, the GCSE Drama theatre trip to see An Inspector Calls at New Wimbledon Theatre will take place on Thursday 28th November. Miss Brailsford would also like to praise the positive starts to the academic year from Reece, Katie S, Celica and Adam.

Moving onto GCSE PE, where there have been fantastic numbers at the before school clubs on offer to support students' practical, particularly netball and climbing, with this element of the course equating to 40%. Theory 'catch up' continues on Tuesdays after school in PE1. Well done to those who have attended both so far, demonstrating the level of commitment required to succeed.

A LEVEL RESULTS SUCCESS!

2019 has seen another bumper crop of A Level examination results for Year 13 students at Greenshaw Sixth Form. Over one in five of every grade was at A or A*, with 73% of students achieving a pass at A*-C. Headteacher, Mr House, said: "These results demonstrate the hard work and dedication of both youngsters and their staff. At a time when these new exams have harder content it is brilliant to see that inspired learners continue to thrive."

Some individual students attained extraordinary results. The following students achieved three A Level passes, all at A or A* grades: Amy, James, William, Reon, Oliver, Ryan, Joshua,

James, Aisah, Suzanne, Larissa, Mayurapiriyan, Emily and Adnan. Marcus, Aditya and Vithushan achieved the quite extraordinary feat of three A* passes each.

Our A Level students have gone on to on a wide range of destinations, with up to 40 of our Year 13s progressing to undergraduate courses (including several for medicine and law) at prestigious Russell Group universities. We are equally proud that our strong work in the creative arts continues to enable large groups of students to move on to foundation art courses and directly into world leading institutions such as London College of Fashion.

SUPERB GCSE RESULTS

Greenshaw High School was the location for smiles and happiness on 22nd August when Year 11 students nervously opened their GCSE results envelopes. With three quarters of all qualifications being graded at 4 or better (the old grade C), and nearly a quarter at 7 or higher (what used to be A grade) there were few reasons for nerves.

Mr House, said: "Do not underestimate the pressure of these new GCSE courses. Many subjects have more exams than previously, and in all specifications what is expected of students has risen. I am really proud of all of our students' achievements, and grateful for the support of the staff who are also navigating these new courses. And of course, the families without whom none of this would have been possible."

Greenshaw is proud to receive the Healthy Minds kitemark



Greenshaw High School is proud to announce that its involvement in the Healthy Minds research project has led the school to being awarded the kitemark, only achieved by schools who successfully met all the criteria of the project to a consistently high

standard. This milestone is a major move forward in our mission to deliver the best personal, social and health education available and evidence of our ongoing commitment to the personal development of our students.

Healthy Minds is an evidence-based health and relationships curriculum for Years 7 to 10 that is equipping young people with the life skills they need to thrive in and beyond school. This unique study helps us understand the impact that good quality teaching and learning can have on important outcomes, and how to create a culture of resilience where teachers and students thrive.

Starting as a research project by the London School of Economics and Bounce Forward, Healthy Minds was funded by the Education Endowment Foundation and trialled in 34 schools over five years. Building on learning from the project and feedback from teachers and students, the curriculum is now available to all schools.



As Lord Richard Layard, London School of Economics has said: "Young people need to develop healthy minds and schools should make it a top priority. It is the most outstanding wellbeing curriculum in the world".

Headteacher Mr House said: ""We are really proud that we committed to the Healthy Minds project several years ago, and have played a key role in its evaluation and planning. As a school we remain committed to being a place with an equal focus on wellbeing and pupil results. The Healthy Minds programme gives us a dedicated space in the curriculum to ensure this aspiration is made a reality."

The curriculum consists of 113 lessons over four years and includes topics such as resilience, mental health, social media, mindfulness, sex education, alcohol and drug awareness, relationships, decision making, media awareness and more. Students across the 34 schools involved in the research project completed questionnaires before and after completing the curriculum, the results can be seen below.

Successful Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award expedition

Over the first two weekends in September, 54 of our Year 10 and 11 students completed their expedition section of their Bronze Duke of Edinburgh award. They camped in the grounds of Polesden Lacey, a National Trust property near Dorking in

Surrey, which was a glorious setting.

Their first day consisted of navigation training and, in their groups, the students undertook a demanding hike around Ranmore Common. The second day proved to be even more of a physical challenge, and the need to be adept with their map reading and compass skills was crucial. The students undertook a tough nine mile hike across Denbies Hillside and the surrounding areas, hiking a stretch of the North Downs Way, where at one point, they climbed 125 metres.

Well done to all students for having completed this section of the award, and I look forward to seeing evidence of completion of the other sections in the next few weeks. Thank you to Mr Clarke, Ms Wilson and Mrs Clarke for their support over the weekends.

Why we do things the way we do as a school



Mr House spoke to students across the school about the reasons for some of the things we do in lessons. He explained that the use of mini whiteboards in lessons, and not doing much 'hands up' answering was to ensure that all

students were thinking deeply, rather than relying on students who were confident enough to give out answers aloud. The mini whiteboards also allow staff to see what all students know, especially if the walk around the room and see all students' answers. Mr House also explained about the 'testing effect', which has shown that long term memory is improved by retrieving information. Bluntly, if we're tested on something repeatedly, we recall it better over time. We retrieve information at the start of every lesson in what we call a 'Do Now', and he explained why this can have a great impact.

Both of these teaching techniques have been shown to positively improve students' learning, and their overall performance. We have been awarded 'Research School' status in recognition of the fact that we try to look at what has worked in other schools around the world and adopt the best practice here at Greenshaw.
