An update on Year 13

Issue 4 – February 2020



Welcome back to our first newsletter of 2020. It has been yet another very busy few weeks with UCAS applications now completed and submitted, and many of our Year 13 students are in full receipt of their offers. This year has seen our highest number of Oxbridge interviews and all these have done really well, with three students successfully achieving offers.

These are both exciting and stressful times for students, especially when considering which offers to accept. Firstly, there is no immediate rush to finalise their choices, i.e. to make a firm and insurance choice and discard the other three potential offers. The students will be taken through this during their mentor periods (Week 1, Wednesday, period 2) and therefore they should wait for this advice before making these decisions. I would

also advise waiting on the upcoming mock exam results, as these could help to inform their choices. The other point I would like to draw upon, is the number of you that will have a child with an 'unconditional offer' and the need to have an in depth discussion with them about whether accepting this offer is the right choice for them. If you or your child would like to discuss offers with me, then please do not hesitate to get in touch. You may also have been made aware of student loan application suggestions or prompts. Again, there is no rush for this to be done and we will take the students through this process during their mentor sessions. I usually advise students to do this over the Easter holidays, but they will need your help with this as the questions will relate to household income. Student loan applications must be completed before early May, or else your child will be at risk of not receiving student loans in time for the autumn. I will remind students about this frequently so as to prevent anyone from missing this deadline.

This newsletter also sees the end to the two week Year 13 mock exam period. An opportunity from which I hope students will have truly been able to glean a sense of what the real exams will be like in the summer. In mid-March you will receive an academic report with your child's mock exam results, which will also include their UCAS predicted grades, and predictions from subject departments on what they believe students will achieve in the summer and how these reflect against their benchmark grades. Although knowing these outcomes is important, it is also important to have a conversation that reflects on their wellbeing during mock exams, for example by considering whether students need to temporarily reduce their work commitments, whether they are sleeping and eating well, and whether the revision schedule and techniques they used were effective. Subject teachers will return papers once they have been marked, and tutors will then lead a mentor session on reflecting on the outcome of their efforts and planning for any changes which will need to be made to their study routine.

While I am sure there will be many successes to celebrate, I am also aware that some students will be disappointed with their mock grades. Subject teachers, tutors and myself are on hand to support students in developing action plans to help them to ensure they get the grades they aspire to in the summer. The final summer exams are not far away now and it is important that students continue with an effective study and revision regime up to and beyond the Easter holiday in April. Finally, a note about Year 13 prom, which will be on Thursday 28th June: The tickets need to be paid in full by using the parent online system <u>www.parentpay.com</u>. 


HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL DAY 2020

On Monday 27th January, and in a series of assemblies, the school marked Holocaust Memorial Day, the 75thanniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau by the Soviet Army in 1945.

Mr House and a group of Year 13 students represented Greenshaw at the Sutton borough commemoration event at Sutton Grammar School, while Mr Ferguson led a series of reflective assemblies at school to each year group.

Students were reminded of the nature of the Holocaust and its impact, finding out through survivor testimony what happened to the Jews of Europe and to other groups, such as disabled people between 1942 and 1945 during the Nazi



occupation of much of Europe.

We considered the ten stages of genocide, with a focus on those that unfortunately resonate with lived experience in the UK today, such as classification 'othering', dehumanisation, and the use of propaganda to divide community, and reflected on the historical and current genocides that indicate we have not yet learnt the lessons of the Holocaust.

The assemblies ended with some poetry and an opportunity for silent reflection our responsibilities and remembrance of victims of genocide.
