An update on Year 12

Welcome to the first newsletter of 2020! It has been a very productive and busy start to the year at Greenshaw Sixth Form. Firstly, I want to take the opportunity to thank our sixth formers for their fundraising efforts at the end of last year and into this half term. The sixth form, and in particular Mrs Reid and her charity enrichment group, organised a number of fundraising events as mentioned in the Christmas edition and since then, have been planning a range of events such as a bake sale and a car wash to raise money for the British Heart Foundation. Mrs White and her tutor group have been collecting warm clothing such as socks, gloves, scarves and hats to be distributed to the homeless on behalf of NightWatch, in Sutton. I think that it is important for us to lead on fundraising and raise awareness of various charities and I look forward to supporting future upcoming events led by our students.

Across the next half term, you will be receiving an update from teachers on how your child is progressing in each of their subjects. Teachers have been asked to provide a professional judgement based on assessments, classwork and independent study as to whether they currently predict that students will meet, exceed, or are working below their benchmark grade at A Level. Teachers have also given an attitude for both class effort and independent study using a criteria range of 1 to 4. The data will be used to see where students are needing more support or are struggling and to therefore put some things in place to support them where necessary. This can form part of your discussion with your child's subject teachers at the upcoming Year 12 parents' evening.

The mock exams for Year 12 will take place at the end of June, so while there is some time to change working habits it is important that students are responding positively to feedback from teachers and asking for more help if required. I am keen to continue to focus on independent study time and am committed to supporting the students in becoming accomplished independent learners and ask for your support in this. If you would like to discuss how to support your child and encourage independent study at school and at home, please contact Mrs Reid who is the sixth form study skills manager.

As mentioned in the previous newsletter, Year 12 students should be looking to complete work shadowing applications in order to secure a placement in the summer. They have received support and guidance from the tutors through the tutorial programme and should by now have made significant strides in completing their CVs and contacting companies where they would like to complete a placement. The deadline for these to be secured is Monday 20th April 2020 and all accompanying paperwork (parental form and employer/ placement form) is to be submitted by then. We are keen to support this and would encourage you to support your child wherever possible.

Finally, it is always wonderful to hear feedback from students about their subject experiences outside the classroom. As you will read below, earlier in the term, Year 12 politics students visited the Houses of Parliament, whilst just this week, Paul Scully MP faced a larger group of Year 12 economics, sociology and politics students in a question and answer session. In addition, a further group of Year 12 students partook in a commercial awareness workshop this week, which provided them the opportunity to consider the various skills they will require and need to develop for the world of employment. It is always a privilege as a member of staff to be able to make opportunities such as this available to students and I look forward to hearing about the many more talks, workshops and subject trips planned over the next term.

Houses of Parliament: Select Committee Experience

On Friday 17th January, the Year 12 politics class visited the Houses of Parliament at Westminster.

After a relatively short journey, we had a bite to eat outside the Palace of Westminster near the Thames. We entered the Houses of Parliament through the education entrance, where we were split into two groups. Two expert guides gave us an in-depth tour throughout the lavish building: gold plating, large and impressive paintings, historical busts and statues. It was very imposing and impossible to guess how priceless all the artefacts were.

First, we entered the House of Lords. The guides were very knowledgeable and had lots of interesting information for the class. Talking about all the processes of parliament in class and always seeing these rooms in the news, it was quite surreal to see this place in person, knowing how much important debate and law-making goes on. We got a real and valuable insight into the actual lives and jobs of the decision makers in our country. We had to rush through the latter half of our tour because of our scheduled workshop. We sat down and were put into two competing teams, playing for points. We used little remote controls which we pressed to input our answers and it was a very engaging and educative session.

We then had to independently research our topic of select committees and debate the pros and cons in our teams which everyone really enjoyed – especially Mr Ferguson, who played the role of the Commons Speaker and got a bit carried away.

Unannounced to us, a peer of the House of Lords, Lord Paddick, came in and spoke to the group. It was a real honour and privilege to then ask him questions on his expertise in crime and policing.

It was a fun and educational day for all the students and teachers and a great trip.



HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL DAY 2020

On Monday 27th January, and in a series of assemblies, the school marked Holocaust Memorial Day, the 75thanniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau by the Soviet Army in 1945.

Mr House and a group of Year 13 students represented Greenshaw at the Sutton borough commemoration event at Sutton Grammar School, while Mr Ferguson led a series of reflective assemblies at school to each year group.

Students were reminded of the nature of the Holocaust and its impact, finding out through survivor testimony what happened to the Jews of Europe and to other groups, such as disabled people between 1942 and 1945 during the Nazi

occupation of much of Europe.

We considered the ten stages of genocide, with a focus on those that unfortunately resonate with lived experience in the UK today, such as classification 'othering', dehumanisation, and the use of propaganda to divide community, and reflected on the historical and current genocides that indicate we have not yet learnt the lessons of the Holocaust.

The assemblies ended with some poetry and an opportunity for silent reflection our responsibilities and remembrance of victims of genocide.
