THE ENEMY OF PROGRESS






"Mediocrity will never do. You are capable of something better."

With Christmas being a distant memory and the wintry weather still in full force, you might be forgiven in forgetting we have started the spring term! We have, however, and for the students and parents of Year 8 that means the arrival of their progress reports. I hope that you have all had a chance to look over the reports with your children (available on FROG) which includes their attitude grades and assessment scores. These are an excellent indicator of how your child is progressing and a chance to celebrate excellent effort as

well as an opportunity to discuss areas for improvement together.

The biggest enemy of progress is complacency and this can take two main guises. Those students who are capable and can achieve generally good assessment scores with little effort or those who prefer to stay under the radar and quietly do the minimum in class, whilst drawing little attention to themselves. As Head of Year, I have seen a disappointing amount of grade C allocated for attitude when perusing the data for the whole year group. This is something that myself, Mr Richards and subject teachers are determined to improve. Key to this is the team of tutors around your children, and together we aim to ensure all students receive input based upon their outcomes and progress by various means.


You will know that I have written frequently about the importance of good habits in completing homework, both in quantity and quality. With your support and that of the tutors I am pleased to report that we have seen real progress with this. We do, however, see a consistent peak of homework completion on Sunday (shown below). Whilst we appreciate IXL homework is being completed, it is important it is completed in such a way that supports the maximising of information being stored in the long term memory.



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I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate the students shown below who have consistently been completing IXL to a good standard.



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


THE BIG IDEAS THAT SHAPE OUR WORLD



As part of their weekly homework, students have been continuing their exploration of 'The Big Ideas That Shape Our World.'

Year 8 have been concluding their examination of themes from the early modern period, and have started to consider how the industrial age from about 1750-1900 has influenced modern Britain

Students looked first at the role of propaganda, satire and popular theatre in changing the way we communicate



sophisticated ideas. We then started to look at the shifts in the ideas and the way we live our lives, changes powered by the people that gave power to the people. We examined the impact of the French and American revolutions, industrialisation and urbanisation.

The students are fantastically engaged, writing outstanding reflective pieces and I have been pleased to send so many postcards to parents and carers acknowledging this.

YOUNG GEOGRAPHERS MEASURE THEIR CARBON FOOTPRINT

Our geography club students have just completed some research on their carbon footprint. They have each worked out their individual impact on the planet and annotated a 'carbon foot' with ways that they could reduce their carbon footprint. It has helped to highlight how they can reduce their impact on the planet and it also helped them to realise that they have a relatively low carbon footprint. On average, geography club's footprint is 20% better than the UK's.

HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL DAY

On Monday 27th January, and in a series of assemblies, the school marked Holocaust Memorial Day, the 75thanniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau by the Soviet Army in 1945.

Mr House and a group of Year 13 students represented Greenshaw at the Sutton borough commemoration event at Sutton Grammar School, while Mr Ferguson led a series of reflective assemblies at school to each year group.


Students were reminded of the nature of the Holocaust and its impact, finding out through survivor testimony what happened to the Jews of Europe and to other groups, such as disabled people between 1942 and 1945 during the Nazi

occupation of much of Europe.

We considered the ten stages of genocide, with a focus on those that unfortunately resonate with lived experience in the UK today, such as classification 'othering', dehumanisation, and the use of propaganda to divide community, and reflected on the historical and current genocides that indicate we have not yet learnt the lessons of the Holocaust.

The assemblies ended with some poetry and an opportunity for silent reflection our responsibilities and remembrance of victims of genocide.
